<p><b>Tier I Supports: Social Thinking (PK-5)</b>            Social Thinking is a combination of instructional materials that help children build foundational social competencies and essential life skills through stories, lessons, and play activities. The teachings help kids better understand themselves and others, develop self-awareness, perspective taking, social problem solving, and supports students' social-emotional learning, relationship building, classroom learning, and academic performance.</p>	1, 2A, 2F, 2Nii, 2L	FY22 One- time expense
<p><b>Tier I Supports: Branching Minds (K-8)</b>            Branching minds is an online software that will link teachers and learning scientists together to bridge research and practice, and develop innovative intervention management software technology (RTI / MTSS). <p><b>Safe and Civil Schools Training</b>            Safe and Civil Schools offers positive behavioral support through consulting, training, and coaching services designed to assist all K-12 school personnel in using research-based positive behavior support strategies to structure all school settings for success.</p> <p>We had previously participated in a research study with Safe and Civil Schools with our six middle schools: three middle schools within the treatment group and three middle schools enrolled in the control group. We completed the research study and look to expand to all of our secondary sites. The first goal is to train a key group of leaders (administrators and teachers) in system wide positive behavioral supports and knowledge. <p><b>Life Lines Curriculum (K-5)</b>            Lifelines is a whole-school program that educates administrators, faculty and staff, parents, and students on the facts about suicide and their roles in suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention.</p>	1, 2A, 2F, 2Nii, 2L	FY22 One-time expense

<p><b>5 School Counselors</b> School counselors work to maximize student success, promoting access and equity for all students. <p><b>Reading/Math Tutoring at All Grade Levels</b> A 2020 meta-analysis by the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab in Cambridge, Massachusetts, found that tutoring programs regularly produce large improvements in student academic outcomes. The Lab reviewed 96 randomized experiments and determined the average effect of tutoring was a 0.37 standard deviation increase in student learning, or the equivalent of a student moving from the 50th percentile to almost the 66th percentile of achievement.</p>	1, 2A, 2B, 2F, 2L, 2M, 2Ni, 2Nii	FY22 FY23 FY24
<p><b>Expanded Summer School Opportunities for elementary and middle school students</b> EPS will move from only having a Title I summer school for K-2<sup>nd</sup> graders and RSA summer school for 3<sup>rd</sup> graders to a K-5<sup>th</sup> grade summer school for all elementary schools and a 6<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> grade summer school for all middle schools. <p><b>RTI Scheduler for All Middle Schools</b> With RTI Scheduler software, teachers will be able to make real-time informed decisions on students from the intervention or enrichment that students access. Students are able to choose a section of intervention or enrichment. And teachers have the ability to choose students to attend the intervention or enrichment session. Over the course of a few months, we will identify growth and opportunities for growth with our students via the intervention or enrichment for each student. <p><b>Advanced Placement Biology and Chemistry Laboratory Materials</b> AP Biology and AP Chemistry are college-level courses that require college-level foundational support. Students are expected to perform hands-on labs that give them insight into the nature of science and help them understand biological and chemical concepts, as well as how evidence can be obtained to support those concepts. Due to the pandemic, students currently enrolled in these AP Biology and AP Chemistry have not had the typical learning experiences leading up to these college-level courses needed to adequately prepare them for advanced level learning expectations. In order to support online learners and prevent further learning loss, it is imperative that we provide all students with access to the appropriate curriculum, as well as supplemental materials and resources including basic laboratory supplies.</p>	A, 2A, 2F, 2Nii, 2Niii, 2R	FY22 One-time expense

<p>Cybersecurity computer science education is a growing program that Edmond students are extremely interested in. By providing rigorous electives that integrate math, science, and technology, we are not only filling academic achievement gaps but also giving students a big reason to be at school every day. Cybersecurity also provides traditional as well as non-traditional post-secondary pathways that reach and prepare even more students for the future. Multiple studies indicate that Computer Science education can help students beyond computing. Computer Science education has been linked with higher rates of college enrollment and improved problem-solving abilities.</p>		FY24
<p><b>Improved Technology for Virtual Edmond Teachers</b> Improved technology for the K-12 Virtual Edmond program to strengthen the learning of our virtual students including high quality, better resolution document cameras; devices with touch screen capability; multiple monitors to see students and the lesson at the same time; E-glass to allow students to see teachers writing, similar to a whiteboard but with letters and symbols in the correct student view; and headsets for better sound resolution for both students and teachers.</p>	1, 2A, 2E, 2F, 2K, 2M, 2Niii, 2R	FY22 One-time expense

The consultant's duties will include: recognize and work toward meeting the hiring needs of Edmond Public Schools; create and implement recruiting strategies; search for potential candidates through multiple sources; screen applicants, matching them to job positions; arrange for and attend job fairs; and create and post job advertisements.</p>	2A, 2E, 2J, 2R	FY22
